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The regular meeting of the Bowling Green City Council, held in the Council Chamber, 304 North Church Street, Bowling Green, Ohio was called to order at 7:00 p.m. by Council President Aspacher. The meeting began with the Pledge of Allegiance.

On roll call vote, Council Members Aspacher, Gordon, Jeffers, McOmber, Rowland, Seeliger and Zanfardino responded. Also present were Mayor Richard Edwards, Municipal Administrator Lori Tretter, City Attorney Michael Marsh, Public Works Director Brian Craft, Utilities Director Brian O'Connell, Planning Director Heather Saylor, and Parks & Recreation Director Kristin Otley. Clerk of Council Kay Scherreik was not present and replaced by Acting Clerk Michelle Fitzgerald.

Council Member Seeliger moved, Rowland seconded, to approve the minutes of the regular meeting held January 17, 2017 as distributed. Council President Aspacher declared the motion carried.

CORRESPONDENCE

Acting Clerk Michelle Fitzgerald noted that a listing of budget transfers was received from Finance Director Brian Bushong and distributed to Council prior to the meeting for approval. Council Member Jeffers moved, Gordon seconded to approve the budget transfers. After a unanimous voice vote, Council President Aspacher declared the motion carried. A copy of the transfers is attached and made a part of these minutes.

Acting Clerk also noted that distributed to Council prior to the meeting is the Financial Budget Summary report for the month of December 2016.

Acting Clerk reported that an application was received from the Ohio Division of Liquor Control for a transfer of a Class C1 and C2 liquor permit from Falcon Food Mart, Inc., DBA Falcon Food Mart 2 located at 1414 E. Wooster Street, Bowling Green, to MRS Retail, LLC, dba Falcon Food Mart 2 at the same location. A check of the records was received from the Police Division and no detrimental information was noted.

OFFICIAL REPORTS

Mayor Edwards reported that the 165-acre solar field located at the corner of Newton Road and Carter Road is now fully operational. The site contains more than 85,000 panels and is capable of producing 20 megawatts of alternative current electricity. Mayor Edwards said that the best output to date has been 19.6 MW, very close to the 20 MW threshold. The site is expected to annually produce the equivalent of the energy used to power about 3,000 homes. The field will avoid approximately 25,000 metric tons of carbon dioxide emissions per year since the energy is generated from a non-fossil fuel resource. He further noted that all of the contractual obligations with the State of Ohio have been met.

Mayor Edwards noted that the next Community Action Plan meeting will be held on Tuesday, February 7, 2017 from 6:00 p.m. – 8:00 p.m. at the Alvin L. Perkins Atrium at the Wood County Courthouse. The Mayor also noted Court Street Connects Festival will be held on Saturday, April 22, 2017 with several events already announced for that event.

Mayor Edwards also reported that the Bowling Green Winterfest Chillabration will be held this weekend, February 10-12, 2017. The 50th anniversary of the BGSU Ice Arena, now renamed the Slater Family Ice Arena, will be commemorated and Olympic ice skater Scott Hamilton will be returning to Bowling Green. Additionally, there will be a ribbon cutting for the Bowling Green Curling Club, Saturday, February 10, 2017 at 10:00 a.m.

The Mayor also noted that the Five Year Plan for the Fire Division is up for third reading and thanked Council for their consideration of the plan. He stated that one important element of the plan is the dramatic reduction of unnecessary runs to BGSU. This is due to Chief Sanderson and his staff working with the Division of Student Affairs and university dorm personnel to reduce the calls which in turn reduces costs as well as wear and tear on equipment.

Mayor Edwards thanked the Transportation and Safety Committee for their work on complete streets and for their collaboration with the Bicycle Safety Commission.

Municipal Administrator Lori Tretter reported that the annual employee recognition breakfast was held on Tuesday, January 31, 2017. This event recognized employees who during 2016 completed their fifth, tenth, fifteenth, twentieth, twenty-fifth, or thirtieth year of continuous full time or non-seasonal, non-temporary, part-time service. Tretter thanked Council Member Robert McOmber for attending every employee recognition breakfast for the last 12 years. Council Member McOmber stated that there is nothing more important he can do to show his appreciation to City employees.

Tretter also acknowledged that grant funding was received by the Police Division and asked Chief Tony Hetrick to discuss the grants. Chief Hetrick reported that Detective Brian Houser of the Police Division recently graduated from the Mobile Device Examiner Course at the United States Secret Service National Forensic Institute in Hoover, Alabama. This all expenses paid training consisted of courses related to the recovery of digital evidence, legal issues and hardware utilization. Hetrick indicated that almost every criminal investigation has a digital component due to the proliferation of cell phones, tablets, GPS and other mobile digital data devices. Effective investigation and prosecution relies heavily on the ability to extract, analyze and present digital forensic evidence in a court of law. This training will give the BG Police Division the capability to bring criminals to justice in an ever evolving digital world. The course not only provided information on trends and methods but also included a grant of \$46,000 in digital forensic software and hardware that will be housed at the BGPD, but will be made available to agencies throughout the region. This is just one of many instances of local collaboration with federal law enforcement agencies that will result in tangible benefits for the citizens of Bowling Green and Northwest Ohio.

Chief Hetrick also reported that the BG Police Division has been awarded a federal grant through the US Department of Justice, administered by the Ohio Criminal Justice Services Office in the amount of \$10,867.00 for the purchase of three in-car video cameras. The grant will assist the Police Division in completing an in-car video upgrade program which was started in 2015. With 18 marked cars, the expense to replace all the cameras at one time was cost prohibitive. Thanks to the Jag LE Grant, the agency has been able to fund 5 cameras during the replacement program so the program will be completed in 2017.

Planning Director Heather Saylor had no report.

Council Member Jeffers commented on a meeting last week with the Planning Commission regarding zoning ordinances. Jeffers indicated that this is part of the Community Action Plan process with consultants from Camiros, Ltd. who have been hired to give advice on housing and development projects. Jeffers said that changes to the code would be very complex and costly and suggested that the City determine what the housing goals are before beginning the process of revising the zoning code. Council Member McOmber stated that a major rewrite of zoning code is estimated by the Camiros consultant to cost between \$100,000 and \$300,000 and would take 18-36 months to complete. He noted that the City doesn't have that money readily available in the budget. Heather Saylor stated that she felt the point of the meeting was to point out gaps in the code that don't align with public goals and to make a determination as to whether the goal is to overhaul whole zoning code or just fix the gaps such as housing code, parking, and the sign code, and her opinion is that the cost estimate may be more for a larger city. Zanfardino stated that a complete overhaul would be expensive but even though the Camiros consultant didn't recommend a piecemeal approach, the City could look at issues and address them before doing a total rewrite. Council Member Rowland stated that the City could implement as much as it can on its own to save money. She stated that enforcement would be a priority and agreed that the City could accomplish much of the work that needs to be done on its own.

Parks & Recreation Director Kristin Otley reported that all three Splash Pad creatures will be ordered this week. This was due to grants and donations totaling \$24,000. Otley also passed out schedule for the BG Winterfest Chillabration celebration and talked about many of the events that are scheduled to take place. Additionally, Otley noted that the annual Daddy Daughter Dance is scheduled for February 17, 2017 and the Brown Bag Music Series is currently underway in partnership with Bowling Green State University. Additionally, information was distributed to council regarding the Soup and Such Hike scheduled on Saturday, February 25, 2017.

Council Member Rowland thanked Kristin Otley and Lori Tretter for volunteering to be guest bartenders at the Clara's Creatures fundraising event.

City Attorney Michael Marsh had no report.

Utilities Director Brian O'Connell had no report. Council President Aspacher congratulated O'Connell on the completion of the solar project and stated that Council looks forward to the open house and ribbon cutting.

Public Work Director Brian Craft reported that the South Main St./Gypsy Lane Rd. traffic signal is now up and running. He noted that the bulbs are LED and the signal has a battery backup so if the power were to go out, the signal would continue to work for 8-12 hours. The cost of the project was \$950,000, however approximately \$750,000 of that was paid by the Traffic Improvement Program (TIP) program through the Toledo Metropolitan Area Council of Governments (TMACOG) in which the City contributes 20% of the project and the remaining 80% is paid through federal dollars. Craft also noted that a new traffic signal will be going in at Poe Rd. and Fairview Ave. in the spring. The cost is approximately \$156,000 which will be paid by the City. Craft further noted that bids were opened for Napoleon Rd. reconstruction which would involve paving Napoleon Rd. from South Main St. to South College St. TIP provided \$332,000 for that project. The apparent low bidder is the Shelly Company. Shelly is also the contractor for the Conneaut Ave. and Fairview Ave. project which is an Ohio Public Works Commission (OPWC) grant for which the City received \$274,000.

Council Member Gordon, for the Community Improvement Committee, introduced a resolution authorizing the submittal of a proposal(s) with the Ohio Department of Transportation for a 5339(B) grant through the U.S. Department of Transportation (DOT) Federal Transit Administration (FTA), as authorized under the Federal transit law and funds available from the Ohio Public Transportation Grant program and executing a contract with the Ohio Department of Transportation upon grant proposal acceptance.

Council Member Gordon, for the Community Improvement Committee, introduced and ordinance amending and adopting Section 152.20(H)(1) of the Codified Ordinances of the City of Bowling Green, Ohio, regarding nuisance conditions prohibited.

COUNCIL COMMITTEE REPORTS

Council Member Zanfardino reported that the Transportation and Safety Committee met prior the City Council Meeting to discuss complete streets. The meeting had two purposes. One to revisit the Conneaut and Fairview project and to further discuss the Yay Bikes! concept that was introduced to Bowling Green in November 2016. The committee made recommendation to the full council based on bid information provided to them by City Engineer Jason Sisco.

Council President Aspacher asked for a discussion for all council members to weigh in on the recommendations from the Transportation and Safety Committee and the specific recommendation from the City Engineer.

City Engineer Jason Sisco recommended both Alternate B & C. Alternate B, includes widening of the existing sidewalks on Fairview from 4 feet to 6 feet. Alternate C, includes a six-foot sidewalk from a mid-block crossing on Fairview between Liberty Street and Evers Avenue, south and along Conneaut continuing to City Park. Instead of separate bike lanes on Conneaut and Fairview, the recommendation was to use "sharrows," which are shared lane markings. Council Members agreed with Sisco's recommendations.

Council Member McOmber stated that he thought that the project would be very nice and was something that people would take note of. Council Member Seeliger stated that he was pleased that the sidewalk widening on Fairview could be done without moving closer to homes since the widening would be done from the pavement along the road instead of resident's yards.

Council President Michael Aspacher said that this represented the first implementation of the complete streets design concepts. He said it is exciting that the City is doing something related to complete streets and he is interested in getting feedback from residents on the sharrows. He also said this project will serve as a template on how future paving projects would be completed.

Council Member McOmber said that there is \$10,000 available to be used for signage that will indicate bicyclists may use a full lane and that he feels that that will be another benefit to the bicycle community.

LOBBY VISITATION

Lisa Kochheiser, 1045 Varsity West, addressed Council regarding safety concerns for the Bowling Green water supply posed by the proposed Nexus natural gas pipeline as it relates to the Bowling Green fault line. Ms. Kochheiser introduced Dr. Andrew Kear, a Bowling Green State University professor who is a geologist and environmental policy expert.

Dr. Kear, of 867 Walnut St., Perrysburg, told Council that he completed a report that the pipeline shows some risk due to its planned proximity to the Bowling Green fault. Dr. Kear stated that the fault can actually be seen on the surface locally and that drilling fluids could lubricate the fault resulting in seismic activity. Additionally, the pipeline would be 700 feet from the water plant and a quarter mile from an active blasting quarry on the Waterville side of the river. Dr. Kear also stated that the Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) showed that a karst topography study had not yet been completed. He said risks associated with that are not adequately addressed in the EIS.

Council members discussed the importance of water safety and the likelihood of the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission making any changes to the proposed pipeline. Dr. Kear stated that he felt it is worth the effort to try. Council President Michael Aspacher said council would take the matter under advisement.

Terry Lodge, a Toledo attorney representing a new citizens group, UC4POWER also addressed Council regarding the Nexus pipeline and stated that the City "would speak with a louder voice" than a grassroots organization. He stated that it is harder to make changes on appeal and that now is the time for the science to be seriously engaged.

Jennifer Karches, 407 N. Main St. addressed Council regarding the green space located at the corners of West Wooster, South Church and South Grove streets. She questioned the diversity of the steering committee and expressed concern that the current plan did not include enough public input and would not be an attraction to young people. Council President Aspacher said that the project is an evolving situation. Mayor Edwards indicated that the design is very basic and the new steering committee is in the process of forming sub-committees and there would be a very open process with public input.

Acting Clerk read Ordinance #8559 amending the Zoning District Map of the City of Bowling Green, Ohio, for 510 East Wooster Street from B-2 General Commercial to B-5 Transitional Central Business District zoning, for second reading.

Acting Clerk read Ordinance # 8560 amending the Zoning District Map of the City of Bowling Green, Ohio, for 516 East Wooster Street from B-2 General Commercial to B-5 Transitional Central Business District zoning, for second reading.

Acting Clerk read Resolution #3652 adopting the Bowling Green Fire Division 5-year Strategic Plan, for third reading.

Council Member Zanfardino moved, McOmber seconded, to adopt Resolution # #3652. On roll call vote, Council Members Aspacher, Gordon, Jeffers, McOmber, Rowland, Seeliger, and Zanfardino voted yes. Council President Aspacher declared the motion carried, and Resolution #3652 adopted.

Council Member Jeffers moved, Zanfardino seconded to remove from the table and adopt Ordinance #8554 establishing interim zoning for property recently annexed to the City as petitioned for by Linda St. Arnaud and generally known as 16415 Brim Road of R-2 Single Family Residential zoning. Council Member Jeffers stated that there was a Public Hearing prior to the Council Meeting and there were no detrimental comments to this action. On roll call vote, Council Members Gordon, Jeffers, McOmber, Rowland, Seeliger, Zanfardino, and Aspacher voted yes. Council President Aspacher declared the motion carried.

Council President Aspacher asked if there was any other business to come before Council. Council Member Rowland stated that she would like to add to the conversation regarding the Nexus Pipeline that she is not in favor of filing a lawsuit and asked if City administration would be willing to meet with the scientists in the community to come to a conclusion as to whether there are water safety concerns or not and then come back to Council to report their findings.

Council President Aspacher reported that on February 18, 2017 t 9:00 a.m. in Council Chamber, City Council and City Administration and administrative staff will hold their annual Strategic Planning Meeting.

City Council thanked Boy Scout Troop #422 from Conneaut Elementary for attending the meeting.

Council Member Seeliger moved, Rowland seconded to adjourn. On unanimous voice vote, Council President Aspacher adjourned the February 6, 2017 regular meeting of the City Council at 8:36 p.m., subject to call.
